Messages for Parents & Carers

We would like to thank parents and carers for their support with our uniform expectations. Throughout the term, the standard of uniform has been generally high. We appreciate that some of you may take the opportunity over the Christmas holidays to replace school shoes or other items of uniform. When doing so we would ask you to be mindful of our uniform policy please. The full list is on the EWS website in the parents section

- Trousers and Skirts- Trousers may be woven fabric, have a waistband and fly, tapered or straight and not be skin tight. Skirts must be pleated and knee length.
- Denims, leggings/jeggings or cords are not acceptable
- Trousers should not have studs or zip embellishment
- Black school shoes
- No canvas, leisure or trainer shoes, no logos or heels – including leather trainers and converse
- Outside coat or plain jacket
- No hoodies or cropped jumpers
- Plain black jumper (optional), only to be worn under blazer with no logos
- Students may wear one pair of earrings (either studs or very small hoops). No other visible piercings are allowed (eg. nose, lip, eyebrow, tongue etc.)
- Nails are to be no longer than the tip of the finger and only neutral coloured varnish is allowed - no false nails

We would ask parents to be mindful that we may be unable to disclose specific information with you regarding incidents that occur in or out of school involving other students. Whilst we will be frank and honest with you regarding your own child in school, we will not discuss how we have managed, supported or sanctioned other students. Please also be aware that we might need time to investigate an incident and collate information before we are able to discuss outcomes and actions in detail with you.

Recovery Premium

We are pleased to be able to support our Key Stage 4 students in Years 10 and 11 with some intervention programmes in their core subjects of English, Maths and Science. We are able to do this using extra funding given to Schools this year as part of the Recovery Premium and the subsidised National Tutoring Programme. Below is a breakdown of the tuition sessions we are able to offer.

All of our Year 11 students will receive Science intervention. Year 11 combined Science students have had a drop-down day in the last week of term focussing on Chemistry as this was shown to be their weakest area in the recent mocks; whilst our Triple Scientists will be having theirs on Wednesday 10th January.

For some students in year 11 we will also be running Maths and English small group tuition. Small group tuition will also take place also in English, Maths and Science for a few of our year 10 students.

All intervention will take place during school time on a rolling programme - for example if a student receives intervention Monday Period 1 in the first week, they will then attend Monday Period 2 the second, Monday Period 3 during the third week etc. Students will be put into groups of 3 and their teachers will liaise with the tutors on which topics they would like them to cover which may be different for different groups. The majority of these sessions will take place face-to-face in school, however some may be required to take place online.

Departments within school will also be putting on intervention sessions after school or at lunchtime where required and they will be in touch regarding this if they have not done so already.

A provisional list of students for the small group tuition sessions has been collated based on students' target current grades; however if you would like your son/daughter to be considered please email NTP2021@ewsacademy.org.uk with your child's name and form, and which subject you would like them to have tuition in (the funding will not allow students to have tuition in more than one subject). Priority will be given to those students who are in receipt of free school meals.

We are currently trying to access further funding to put in place tuition for our Year 9 students and will contact parents if we have been successful. A select number of Year 7 and 8 students receive catch-up sessions in English and Maths from our teaching assistants; these groups are re-assessed every 6 weeks. Year 12 RSE Day

On Friday 5th November, 3 specialist RSE educators from the Grace Foundation ran workshops for Year 12. The first workshop focused on how to build and maintain positive, healthy and respectful relationships.

This included information, activities and discussion on love languages and conflict resolution. In the second workshop, students explored the development of a foetus during pregnancy, the law and different views and attitudes towards abortion, unplanned pregnancies and they learnt about contraception and STIs. In the final workshop, students learnt about the links between and impact of pornography on the brain, on relationships and on society.

As a result of the day, students said the following:

- "I learnt how people have different needs when it comes to love and relationships so you can't assume"
- "I learnt a lot about abortion and realised how little I knew about pregnancy prior to this lesson"
- "It made my beliefs/values stronger"
- "My values have not changed but have been challenged with other views. I will think more about the topics"
- "I'm more aware of the dangers of porn"
- "I am going to try and use the love languages that are best/preferred by the people I care about"
- "This was a very informative and safe lesson"
- We are so proud of the Year 12 students; for their maturity, thoughtfulness and willingness to discuss and respect others' viewpoints in each workshop.

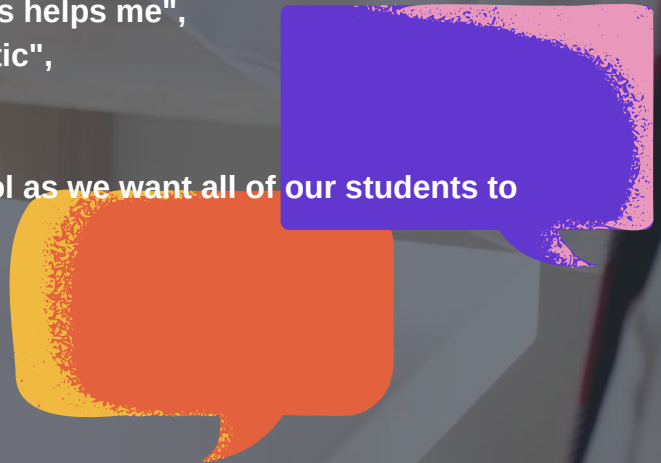
PSHE topics - Overall students feel that our PSHE topics are taught in the right year group, they felt that PSHE was taught consistently and that they were taught a range of different topics.

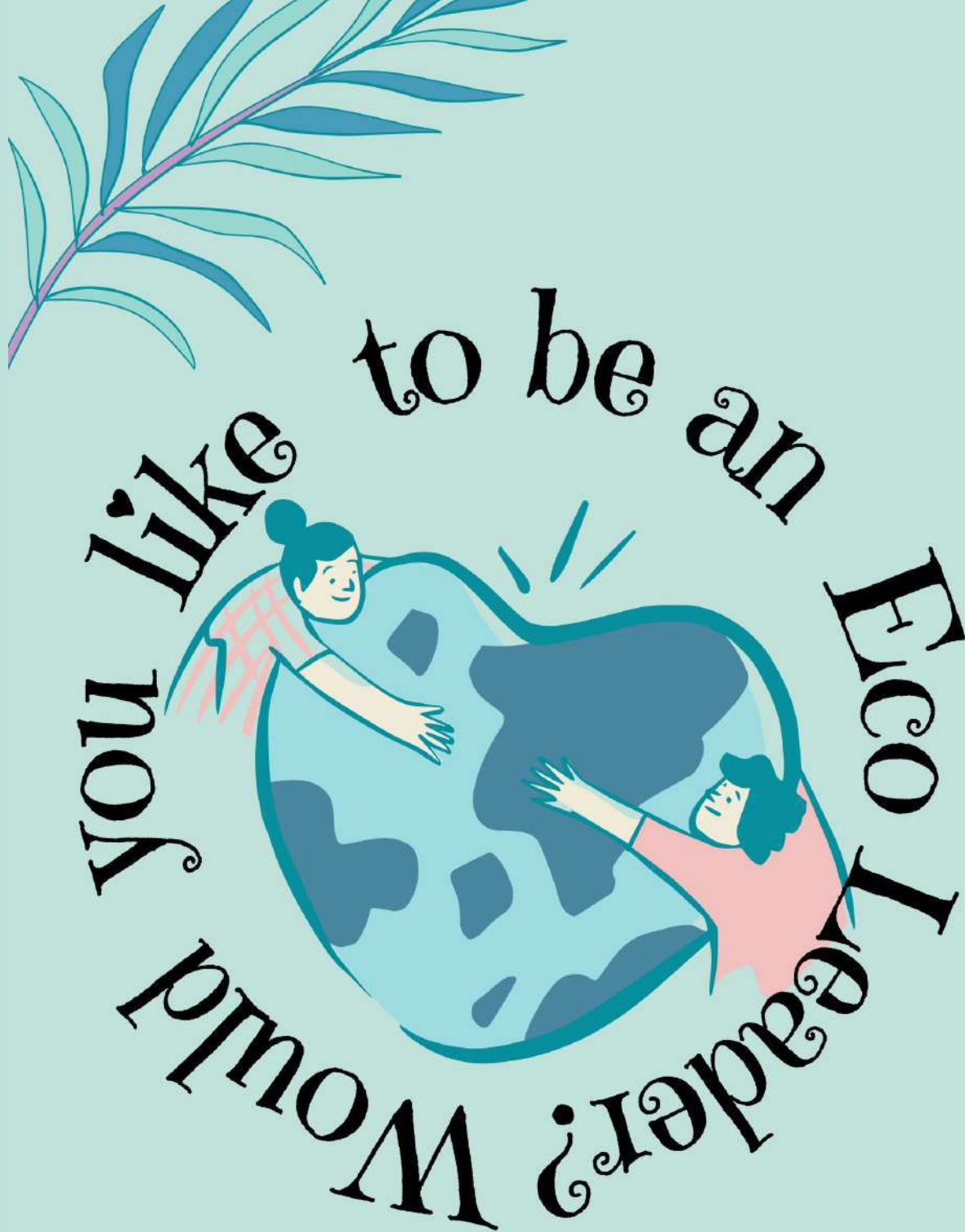
Homework - A number of students reported that in most of their subjects they were given homework that they felt helped improve their understanding and moved their classwork on.

Understanding university offers

How do unis make their decisions?

Each university has different entry requirements. There are also other factors university admissions teams consider when making their decisions.

- Academic and non-academic achievements
- Level of experience and skills to succeed at university
- A passion for the subject area, and does this enthusiasm come across in the application?
- References
- Individual circumstances. Admissions staff will want to consider achievements in context. This is called 'contextualised admissions', and the aim is to form a more complete picture of an individual.

Ultimately, it's the job of the university admissions team to determine whether individuals can succeed on the course they have applied for.

When are you likely to hear back from unis?

The wait for decisions on applications can be agonising. Each university and college will make their decisions at different times, meaning you might hear back before your friends do, or vice versa. However, there are deadlines by which they will need to have decided:

If you're applying to study in 2022

- 19 May 2022 – if you send your application by 26 January 2022.
- 14 July 2022 – if you send your application by 30 June 2022.

If a uni you've applied to doesn't make a decision by the appropriate deadline, that choice will be automatically made unsuccessful.

Decisions universities and colleges can make

Either a conditional or unconditional offer is good news.

- A conditional offer means you still need to meet the requirements – usually exam results.
- An unconditional offer means you've got a place, although there might still be a few things to arrange.
- An unsuccessful or withdrawn choice removes that option, but you could add more.

Conditional offers

These show the conditions you have to meet to get your place confirmed. For most people, this means waiting for results day in summer to see if your exam results meet the conditions. They could be a combination of grades, scores or subjects. A conditional offer might look something like this:

- A levels grade AAB with A in chemistry and at least two other sciences or mathematics
- 112 UCAS Tariff points including BTEC National Diploma grade DM
- AAA from three A levels, or AAB from three A levels and grade B in your Extended Project

You may also get a conditional offer that will change to unconditional if you firmly accept it.

Unconditional offers

- These mean you've already met the entry requirements, so the place is yours if you want it!
- Check the offer carefully. Even if you've already got your qualifications and have met the academic requirements, you might still need to get a DBS or PVG check, provide proof of your results, or meet some financial/medical requirements. If it's not clear, contact the uni or college.
- Remember, by accepting an unconditional offer, you are committing to go to that uni or college, so you can't make an insurance choice.
- If you change your mind, you can decline your place and apply using Clearing.
- If you're taking exams but have been made an unconditional offer, your results won't affect whether or not you get accepted. But, although your place won't be dependent on your grades, taking your exams is really important to prepare you for uni or college and could impact your future employment.
- Some graduate employers take A levels and other qualifications into account when reviewing job applications, so it's important you take this into consideration when preparing for your exams.

Before you make your decision, there are some key things to think about to help you decide which is the right option for you. You might also be interested in reading the UCAS blog for additional advice.

She has sailed through the first round of auditions in all schools so far.

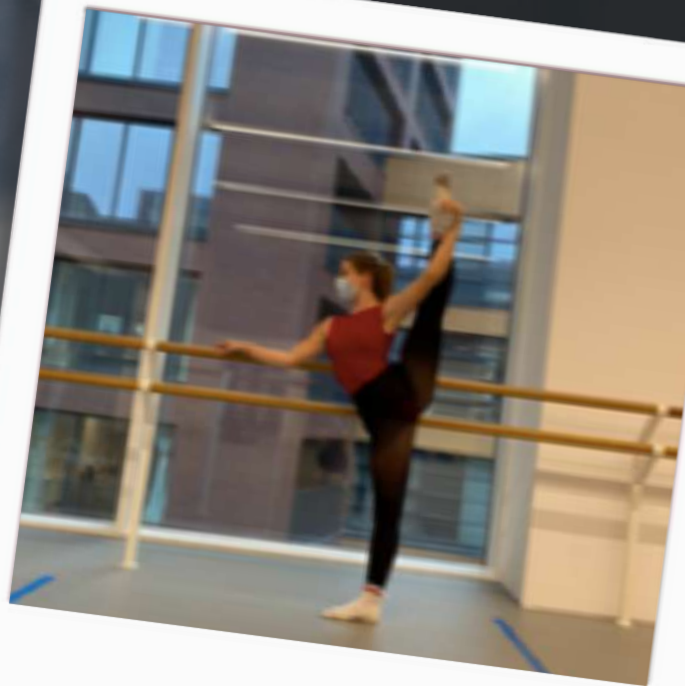
Grace is completely dedicated to her school work as well as achieving the highest levels in her ballet. Her ultimate dream is to be a full time ballet dancer for a high profile company.

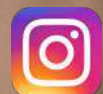
