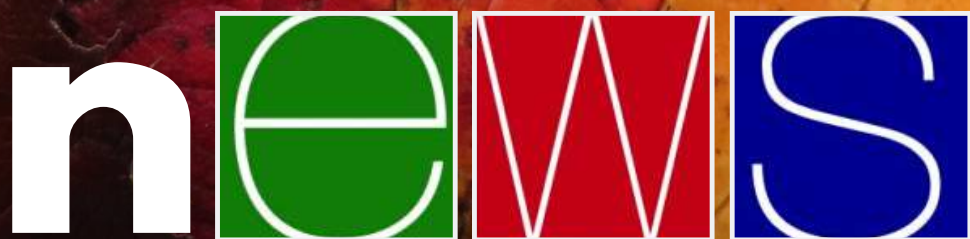

Dear Parents and Carers,

The first half term has been busy, uncertain and productive. Students have returned to school ready to learn and things were somewhat normal in comparison to the last few years. The first half term has also felt uncertain in terms of COVID. The school had relatively few cases for the first 5 weeks of term, however we have seen an upsurge in cases in the last two weeks. We currently have approximately 25 cases on both sites plus 4 staff across both sites. Please can I take this opportunity to remind parents and students to keep testing during the holidays and if a lateral flow test is positive to please book a PCR test immediately.

In other COVID related news the school vaccination programme for 12–15-year-olds ran smoothly on both sites and was successful. Almost 60% of eligible students were vaccinated. Our students' services team, (Mrs Wallace and Mrs Whitehead) liaised with the vaccinations team and ensured that students were supported on site. Thank you to both.

We are encouraging and recommending students wear masks again due to the increase in cases and will be reminding students when they return in November.

Uniform

As winter approaches we encourage students to wear coats to school. We do not allow hoodies or tracksuit tops to be worn. If students wish to wear a plain black jumper under their blazer that is fine. Students should not be wearing nose studs or facial piercings or more than one set of earrings. Please refer to our uniform policy on the school website or contact your child's form tutor if you are unsure. Thank you for your continued support.

Next term

There will be English and Maths GCSE resit external exams in November, if your child is due to sit an exam, they should have the details, if not please contact Miss Gilligan. Mock exams for year 11 and 13 will also take place in November.

The school will be closed on Friday 12th November for an additional Tove Learning Trust INSET day.

And finally, I hope you all have a lovely break and we look forward to welcoming our students back on Monday 1st November.

Year 7 & Year 8 Values Days

From 12th to 15th October, the Ethos team ran Values Days for Year 7 and Year 8. The purpose of each day was to help students understand and recognise each of the school values, learn the relevance and importance of each value, see how to apply the values to their lives and consider the positive reasons for this.

The 'ambition' workshop was delivered by Daniel Cutting, who is a professional football freestyler, youtuber and current 10 x world record holder. In this workshop, students learnt the importance of setting goals and the steps and work required to achieve their goals. During the workshop, students had the opportunity to watch world record demonstrations and learn new football freestyle skills themselves.

The 'confidence' workshop was delivered by Charly and Sophie, our very own Ethos youth workers. Through group work, games and freeze frame activities, students learnt what confidence is, what it looks like, how to overcome a lack of confidence and how to develop confidence for the many situations in life it is required for.

The 'curiosity' workshop was delivered by Chip Kendall, who is from Florida and is a professional singer, songwriter, and communicator. Chip delivered a passionate workshop through music and games that talked about healthy curiosity and how this is key to progress, learning and advancements.

The 'leadership' workshop was delivered by Carol Wheatle, who works for a local charity in Milton Keynes called the Bridge Builders Trust. In this workshop, students were transported to Alan Sugar's boardroom where they learnt why leaders are important and the qualities required for good leadership. Within the context of the boardroom, students engaged in group activities where leaders were appointed and where teams competed against each other to achieve a goal.

Finally, the 'respect' workshop was delivered by Amy Hewitt, who also works for the Bridge Builders Trust. Through drama activities and discussion, students learnt what respect is, what it looks like, why it is so important and how to be respectful in different situations.

A great four days was had by all! Thank you to everyone who took part.

Student Leadership Training

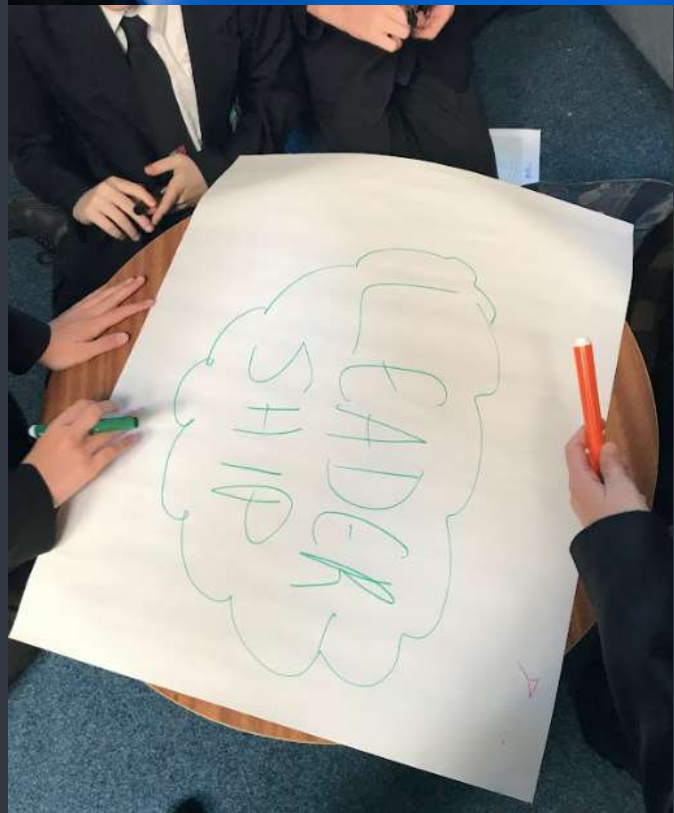
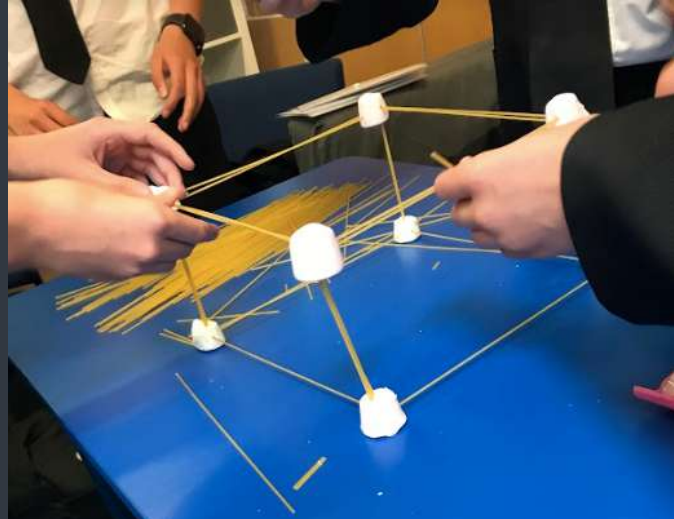
Over a period of two weeks, 64 of our newly appointed student leaders from Years 7-10 attended leadership training to equip them for their role.


We have two Post 16 students from each of our campuses who would like to run a lunchtime book club once a week for the Year 7's and Year 8's starting next term.

A parent/ carers guide to writing personal statements

A student's Personal Statement is a crucial part of their UK university application, and could be the difference between an acceptance and a rejection from their first-choice course. It goes without saying that getting the Personal Statement right is incredibly important. However, for many teens, this will be the first extended piece of writing about their own achievements they have ever had to complete. As a parent, you will naturally want to offer a helping hand to your child when they are working on their submission.

Why do students need to write Personal Statements?

- Put simply, the purpose of a Personal Statement is to allow candidates to set themselves apart from the competition.
- In this short piece of writing, they are given the opportunity to articulate why they'd like to study a particular course or subject, and what skills and experience they possess that show their passion for their chosen field.
- They can also prove their writing talent, their ability to concisely convey information, and explain why they would be an asset to their future university.

What are the rules?

- Only one Statement can be submitted, meaning that ALL universities that the student applies for will receive the same version (so no course or university should be mentioned by name in the Statement)
- The character count cannot exceed 4000 (including spaces and punctuation)
- The deadline for submission to Mr Martin is by Christmas 2021, for submission to UCAS in January 2022
- The work should be completely original, written by the student themselves (although it's okay for teachers and parents to offer advice)

What should be included?

It's a good idea to start off the statement with the most important information: what motivated the student to apply for the particular course or subject. This could include details of relevant extra curricular experiences which helped the student to develop their interest in the subject – for example holiday courses, optional projects or work placements. Details of independent reading and research around a particular subject will help to prove that the student has a genuine interest and initiative. If your child is struggling to decide what to write about, encourage them to reflect on the past few years and to make a list of all the clubs, activities, trips, projects, part-time jobs, hobbies and sports they have been involved with. Did any of these experiences play a role in their university course choice or to their academic development? If so, they can be included in the Statement. Note – don't include details of every single extra-curricular activity – the admissions officers are unlikely to be impressed by a Grade 1 piano exam or a brief stint as a babysitter four years ago.

Bonus extra tips

1. If the student has ambitions for the future which are tied to their university choice, they can mention them in the Personal Statement.
2. If any university taster days or summer courses were attended by the student, these should also be mentioned.
3. Look at the online course descriptions to find out which skills are necessary – then write about those!
4. According to official guidance: "If there are any personal circumstances which have affected the student's educational performance, they can be outlined in the personal statement. For example, this might be something that caused them to miss school – such as a physical or mental health condition, or caring for a family member".
5. If the student has received a bursary or scholarship to cover the costs of their education, they can let the university know about that in their Personal Statement.

A Personal Statement is one part of the whole application, and must be submitted alongside exam grades, predicted exam grades, teacher references and course choices. To find out more about applying to university, the UCAS website has a wealth of high quality advice and resources.

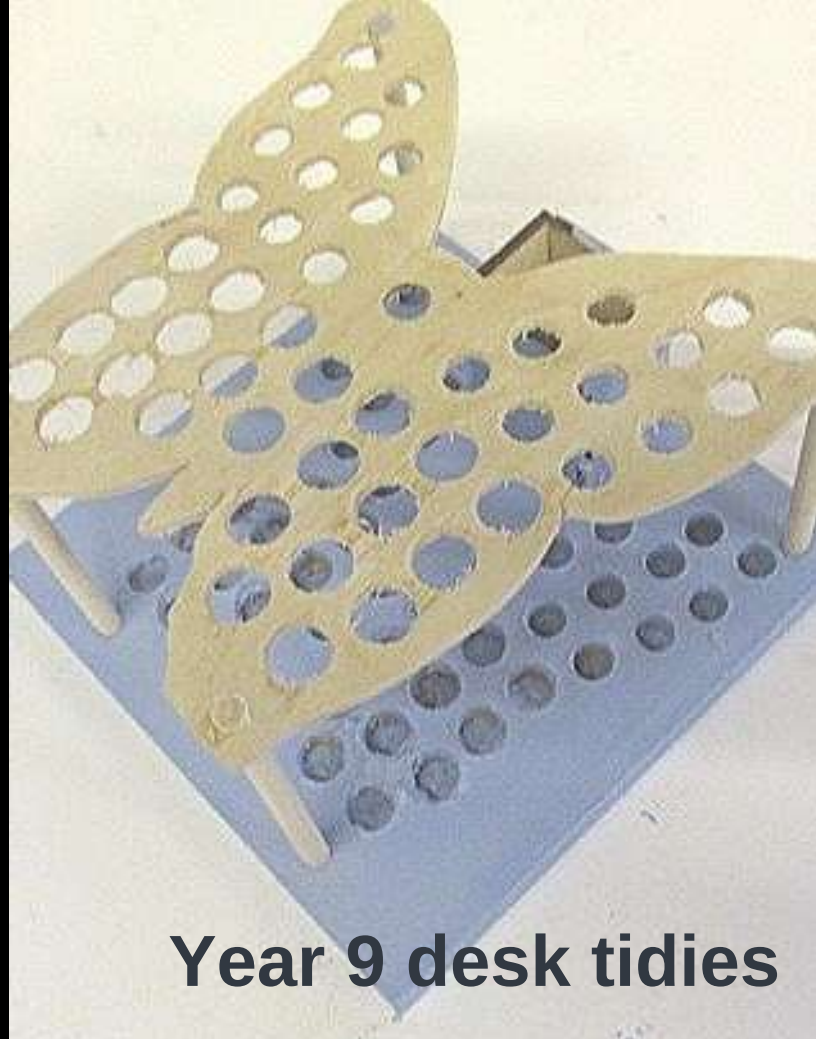

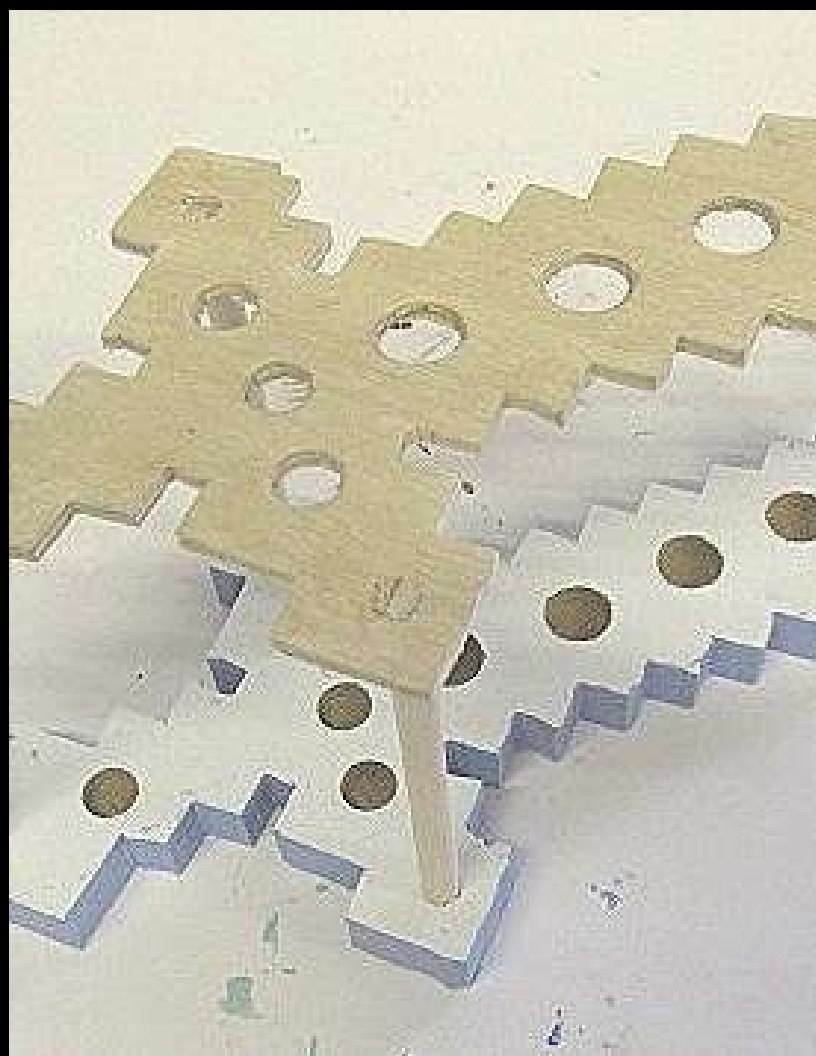

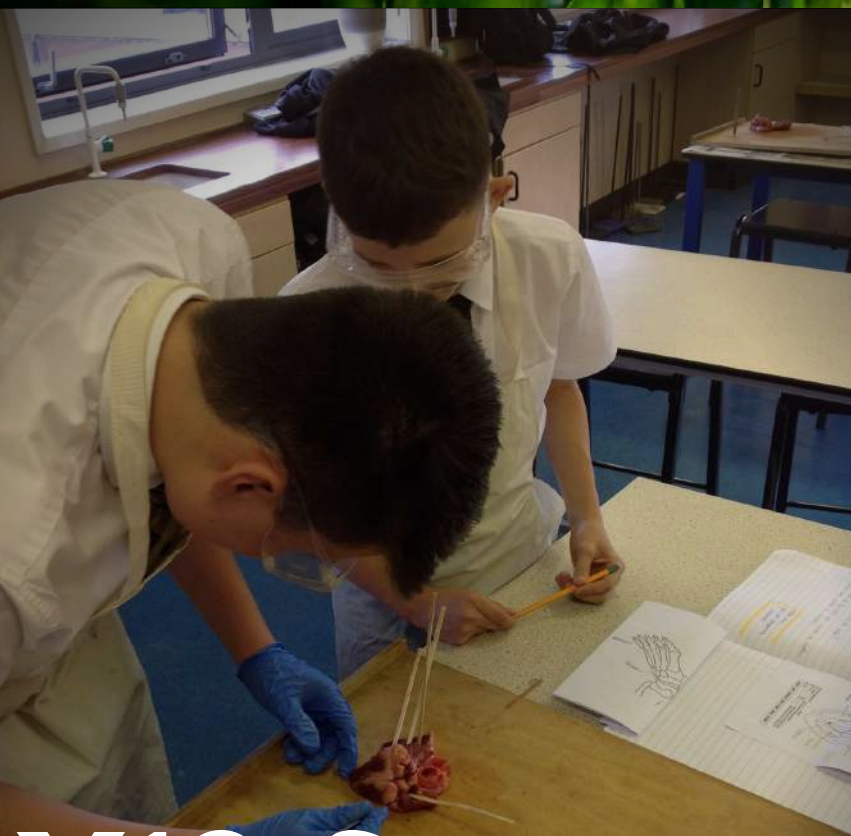

Primary School Orienteering Event

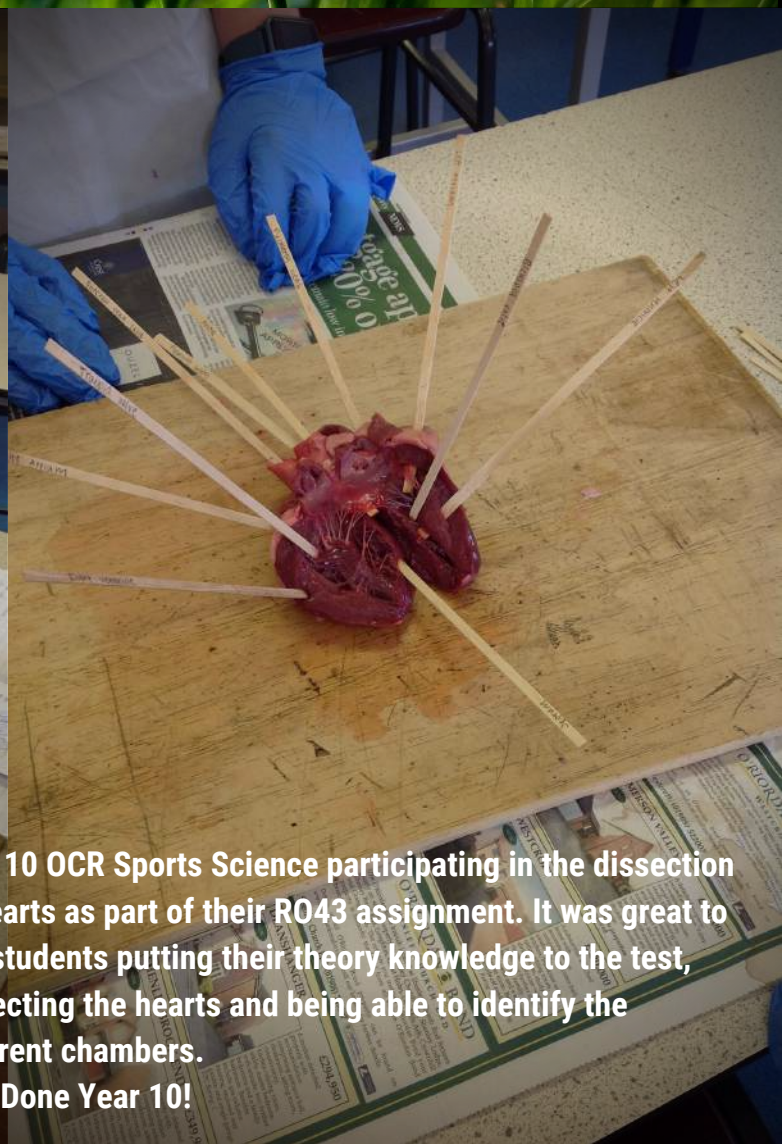

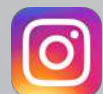
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
